Even though the school “integrated” them and gave them an education, the resources provided spoke volumes about what worth the school placed on that class. And yet Mrs. Gruell, a newly qualified teacher, was able to help their class learn and speak up about the injustices and racism those young people and their families were facing.

Injustice

It wasn't just that the provision for the class was different to the other classes, it showed very clearly what the head of school and the other teacher's thought about those pupils as well. Yet, even if we think about their out of school context, a lot of the young people were faced with threats every day. Can I make it home without being stopped, beaten up or shot? Will I stay loyal to my people or lose all the security I have left?

A lot of the young people never seem to have had anyone who helped them to see their own potential, up until Mrs. Gruwell took over the class. No one believed they could finish High School, no one in their family had finished High School and even if they did, what would they finish High School for? Their lives were all about survival and that was their normality - no one had told them that anything else was possible. No one had given them vision for what a different life could look like.




Explore why Mrs. Gruwell's dad didn't support her in the beginning though he was part of a similar movement. What happened that may have made him change his mind?
